# MIDSUMMER Dreaming



A vacation home in the Hamptons is reimagined with a color and pattern story that's history in the making



## LIVING ROOM

Designers Janie Jones and Elizabeth Miles created a delicate balance of feminine details (like floral and chintz patterns) grounded by masculine elements in the living room. Small touches, like the oyster background on the couches' Bennison Cinnabar fabric, effectively lower the volume on the florals: chocolate marble on the fireplace surround and a Louis XV extendable dining table behind the sofa add richness. "[The homeowners] love to entertain, and that table folds out into a longer dining table," Jones says. "We love the idea that if they have Thanksgiving or a dinner party, they can use that as another dining space."

### TERRACE

Homeowner Anne Pettey—styled by Over the Moon (overthemoon.com)—and her husband already had a collection of furnishings and antiques that Jones and Miles were eager to incorporate into the design. That included an antique table that can serve as a place for mixing drinks and even act as an impromptu sideboard when entertaining outdoors, which the family does frequently during the summer season.





hen a young family of four set out to make a circa-2006 Southampton retreat their own, it would be a renovation with an eye for color, an appreciation of traditional details, and the expertise of Janie Jones and Elizabeth Miles of Birmingham, Alabama-based Hundley Hilton Interiors. The homeowners already had a distinct and elegant style, so the designers knew their goal would be to echo that in a way that left no detail overlooked. "They really wanted to

She and Jones took to their task, focusing on foundational finishes that would mature the newer home with a blend of coastal, custom, and casual details like traditional-style screened doors, antiqued hardware, and wood paneling. From there, the clients' appreciation for color and pattern came to play. "In the Hamptons, there's so much beauty in the spring and summer and fall, and trying to bring all those colors and florals to life in the home was important," says Jones. She and Miles did just that by weaving a thoughtful collection of fabrics and upholstery in coastal hues throughout the home.

put some more love in the home and bring the interiors to life," says Miles.

The result is a haven where chintz, rattan, checks, and antiques artfully mix to produce a master class in design depth with down-to-earth appeal. "We wanted it to feel sophisticated and elegant without feeling too formal," says Jones. "Like the Hamptons."

#### ENTRY

Jones and Miles selected a custom, 8-inch French oak for the home's flooring-with the exception of the entry. Here, they went for a 3-inch plank in the same stain, but in a herringbone pattern, "The entry is a very small space," Jones says. "We didn't want it to feel overwhelming when you walked into the house, but clean and bright and airy to take you into the rest of the home." To create a feeling of formality within the entry, the pair outfitted the space with wall paneling that lends historic appeal while also concealing a jib door that leads to the powder room.





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# POWDER BATH

The entry's powder bath was begging for a jewel-box treatment. Its ceiling and walls feature arches and angles that Jones and Miles covered in Honeysuckle Garden wallpaper by Colefax and Fowler. A rattan mirror gives a coastal nod and is flanked by sconces outfitted in pink sheer linen lamp shades (Fermoie Pink Figured) to play off the wall-covering's rosy hues.



## BAR

In the kitchen's bar area, Jones and Miles had an antiqued glass backsplash installed to show off the homeowner's glassware collection. An unlacquered brass sconce (Maxine by Urban Electric Company) ties in the inlaid brass detail on the cabinetry, a trick Jones and Miles employed to set the drink-mixing station apart from the rest of the space. "We wanted to make it really elegant and be a place that you're immediately drawn to," says Jones. "You've got to have a cocktail as soon as you get on vacation."



#### PRIMARY BEDROOM

A mix-and-match approach with fabrics and patterns created a warm and embracing space in the primary suite. "We were able to tie in a lot of different patterns by keeping them all in the same family," says Miles. The designers stuck with cool blues, tying in some greens, and mixed patterns like the blue linen botanical on the cushion of the built-in bench with a white wallpaper with blue motif (Leafberry by Colefax and Fowler) that extends onto the ceilings to further the enveloping feel of the retreat.



## PINK TWIN BEDROOM

The clients already had two antique beds upholstered in Fuchsia by Colefax and Fowler and dressed in Leontine piqué bedding that served as a starting point for the design. To pull the space together, Jones and Miles had a custom valance created using Sister Parish Treillage in Pink. "We had seen a vintage set of draperies that were smocked at the top that served as our inspiration," says Miles. "We worked on creating it with a little bit of an arch in it, as well, to really define the window."
